
>> paul walker

Paul Walker is not your typical movie star. I know what it feels like to come racing around the corner at 90 miles an hour, sliding the car sideways. I know what gear I'm hitting it in when I'm coming around the corner and where I need to downshift. So to me, that's fun stuff. I like to think my driving sequences are a lot more believable because I do know how to do that.


CG!: That's a pretty intense way to live.
